## Our Sunday Message

If Mark's Gospel were a newspaper it would have a red top like The Sun or the Daily Mirror — meaning that the syntax is short and punchy, to the point and direct.

Mark, and indeed his fellow Evangelists, have one clear goal and purpose, which is to lead their readers to understand that Jesus of Nazareth is the Messiah and help them open up their hearts and minds to grasp what this truly means, that He is also God made man. Mark does this, however, against the backdrop of the resistance, unbelief and rejection which were part and parcel of Jesus' public ministry.

God, in his infinite wisdom, was born in poverty and obscurity. Nazareth was a tiny hamlet in which everybody knew everybody else. The people of Nazareth knew Jesus; they knew His parents, His grandparents and so on. This familiarity, as it so often does, brought with it its own special contempt. The questions of the Nazarene villagers expose a prejudice. They had already made their minds up about Jesus: 'Where did this man get all this? What is the wisdom given to him?...'

What light does this shed on the human heart? Faith is a gift but it also is an invitation to open up our hearts to God. With faith we cannot hedge our bets, wait and see, approach the future half-heartedly.
